



CONCERNED ABOUT HUMAN TRAFFICKING? ANGRY THAT THIS PRACTICE EXISTS?

BE A PART OF THE SOLUTION AND GET INVOLVED!

Students

1. Consider human trafficking as a topic for papers, research projects, etc.
2. Voice your interest in learning more about trafficking to your teachers.
3. Intern with organizations working against human trafficking.
4. Join a student or other anti-human trafficking organization. There isn't one at your school? Start one!
5. Distribute anti-human trafficking posters at school.
6. Volunteer with SlaveFree Madison or National human trafficking groups.
7. Support community anti-human trafficking activities.
8. Organize or participate in a fundraising event helping anti-trafficking efforts.
9. Invite anti-human trafficking speakers to your school.
10. Advocate for campus film societies to show films addressing human trafficking. Offer to facilitate a discussion afterwards..

Community

1. Educate yourself on the issue of human trafficking.
2. Learn the warning signs or clues to human trafficking.
3. Donate to or volunteer with local, national or global anti-trafficking organizations.
4. Become conscious consumers.
5. Distribute anti-human trafficking posters.
6. Spread the word – tell your friends and neighbors about modern day slavery.
7. Keep your ears and eyes on alert for signs of trafficking and alert police to suspicious circumstances.
8. Volunteer with SlaveFree Madison or other local or national human trafficking groups.
9. Advocate for state funding through your elected representatives.
10. Advocate for local attention to this issue and for support for victims.
11. Support community anti-human trafficking activities.
12. Invite anti-human trafficking speakers to a neighborhood or community gathering.
13. Host a neighborhood or community anti-human trafficking event.
14. Read about human trafficking in your book club. Some possible titles are A Crime So Monstrous, Disposable People, Sold, The Girl Who Played with Fire, Half the Sky, The Johns, Children in the Game, A Sacred Bath, Renting Lucy, The Slave Next Door and To Plead Our Own Case. The SlaveFree Madison resource list has additional suggestions.
15. Host a fundraising dinner. Host a potluck and spread the word about human trafficking as well as spend time with friends and meet new people. If you make the dinner yourself, charge per person and the proceeds can be donated to a human trafficking organization!
16. Are you a teacher, volunteer parent, or PTA member? It is important that we educate youth about the reality of human trafficking and how to advocate for policies and funding to address it.
17. Plan a movie night at your house or a theater. See the SlaveFree Madison resource list for possible movie titles. Some of these movies are graphic so keep in mind the audience that you plan to invite.
18. Post hotline flyers in motels and hotels, in windows of local businesses, at community events or on your website, Facebook, Twitter or blog.
19. When traveling, ask your hotel or airline if they have signed "The Code of Ethical Conduct" www.thecode.org demonstrating their commitment to conduct business in a way that discourages child trafficking.
